
The Bill of Rights

The first ten amendments to the Constitution are called the Bill of Rights.

- 1. People have freedom of religion, speech, and press, the right to assemble, and the right to petition the government.
- 2. People have the right to keep and bear arms.
- 3. People cannot be forced to keep soldiers in their homes.
- 4. No official can arrest or search a person or his home without a legal warrant from a judge.
- 5. No one can be tried for a capital crime unless accused by a grand jury. No one can be forced to testify against him or herself. No one can be punished without due process of law. People must be paid for property take for public use.
- 6. People have a right to a speedy trial, to legal counsel, and to confront their accusers.
- 7. People have the right to a jury trial in civil suits exceeding twenty dollars.
- 8. Bail and fines that are excessive are not permitted. Cruel and unusual punishments are not allowed.
- 9. People have other rights in addition to those rights listed in the Constitution.
- 10. Powers not given to the federal government belong to the states or the people.
